

Prayer of the Day

Bountiful God,

Readings

1st Reading: Jonah 3.1-10 OT p. 786

The book of Jonah is more than a moral tale as it has many complex theological themes told through the tragic, comedic character of Jonah. It is about God's gracious forgiveness in the face of repentance and is read in the Jewish calendar on the feast of 'Yom Kippur,' the Day of Atonement when all Israel repented and received God's forgiveness. God's grace is greater than Jonah wants to be the case, yet Jonah reluctantly accepts the call to go to his enemies with God's call to repent.

Psalm: Ps 62.5-12 APBA p. 283

Psalm 62 has words of lament, thanksgiving, praise and wisdom all mixed together. Verses 3 to 4 have lamented the attack of others on the author. In spite of this, the author expresses trust and confidence in God (vs 1-2, 5-6), and calls for trust and refuge in God alone, a call which Jonah tried without success to refuse.

2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 7.29-31 NT p. 157

Paul thought Christ's return was imminent and advised disengagement from the world and its ways of living, in order to be ready for what is to come. This view needs to be balanced with his words elsewhere that encourage engagement with the world for the sake of the Gospel. Being set free from worldly views, allows us to engage with the world from the perspective of one who is 'in Christ' and so avoid the distraction of excessive attachment to family or possessions.

Gospel: Mark 1.14-20 NT p. 32

The shadow of the cross casts a long shadow throughout the Gospel of Mark. The summary of Jesus' preaching in verses 14 to 15 occurs immediately after Herod has put John the Baptist to death. Like John, Jesus' preaching will lead to his execution, and the call of the disciples to follow this same path is poignant. Paradoxically, it is this call to follow, that is a call to a life that is more than death; a call to truly live God's way.
