Readings

First Reading: 1 Samuel 8.4-20, 11.14-15


OT p. 234

This chapter begins a new section in which the following alternate chapters are positive or negative about the need for a king. Today's passage has the people asking for a King and God reluctantly gives in with a warning about what will happen. Samuel has been a local leader, but his sons are proving corrupt and may be why the people want a king 'like the other nations' to lead them in their battle against the invading Philistines. The rejection of God as the ruler of Israel and appointing a King has consequences described here, but it is not until Solomon ascends the throne (965 BCE) that this prediction comes true.

Psalm: Psalm 138

This psalm is a thanksgiving song that praises God as the source of life and the protector of the people. The proclamation of thanksgiving in Psalm 138 suggests that the Lord has answered the psalmist's desperate plea. Verses 4 and 5 are pertinent to the idea from the first reading, that it is God who is sovereign over all things, even the leaders of the nations.

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 4.13-5.1

NT p. 167

This passage picks up in the middle of Paul's extended argument for the validity of his ministry among the Christians in Corinth. Here, Paul knows that he is not impressive and powerful but argues that he is prepared to be vulnerable and take Christ and his suffering as his model. The kind of suffering and physical challenges he faces are signs precisely of the death of Christ at work in him, that the life of Christ may be made known to them.

Gospel: Mark 3.20-35

NT p. 35

Family ties were typically very strong in his Jewish culture. By setting out courageously on a new adventure instead of doing what all families would have expected at age 30, namely getting married and having children to build security for the future of the clan, Jesus had already challenged established patterns. Here, Jesus calls for people to embrace the family of solidarity with him in doing God's will and being good news for the poor.

From your Rector...

The Rite of *Admission to Communion* is a relatively new thing within the Anglican Church. Prior to this, the two initiation 'rites' which people went through were Baptism and Confirmation, with the candidate not being able to receive Holy Communion until they had been confirmed, typically around 12-14 years of age. Interestingly, this is completely different to the early Church, where there is evidence that Baptism was the single rite, and that it was completed at the time by partaking in the act of Holy Communion.

Over the last decade or so, it has been recognized that to deny people (usually children) the Sacrament of Holy Communion until they were confirmed was wrong, and so many churches now offer Admission to Communion as a 'stepping-stone' for children of around 7 years and older, who are clearly becoming curious and interested in what happens when their parents go to the rail and receive bread and wine, and they only get a blessing, but who may not be ready to make their own profession of faith as is required in Confirmation.

In my opinion, this is a great innovation, as it takes the pressure off, and children are not confirmed too early, before they have a good understanding of what is required. They are, however, able to enjoy the 'full participation' in the service, and they feel more part of the action.

Over the next month Abigail Steyn, Ryan Navaratnam, Joshua Goodes, Hanna Phillips, and Jacob Harris will undertake a preparation course in order to be admitted as Communicant members of the Church on Sunday 8th July. I ask that you pray for them, as they begin this important and exciting time in their journey with Christ.
