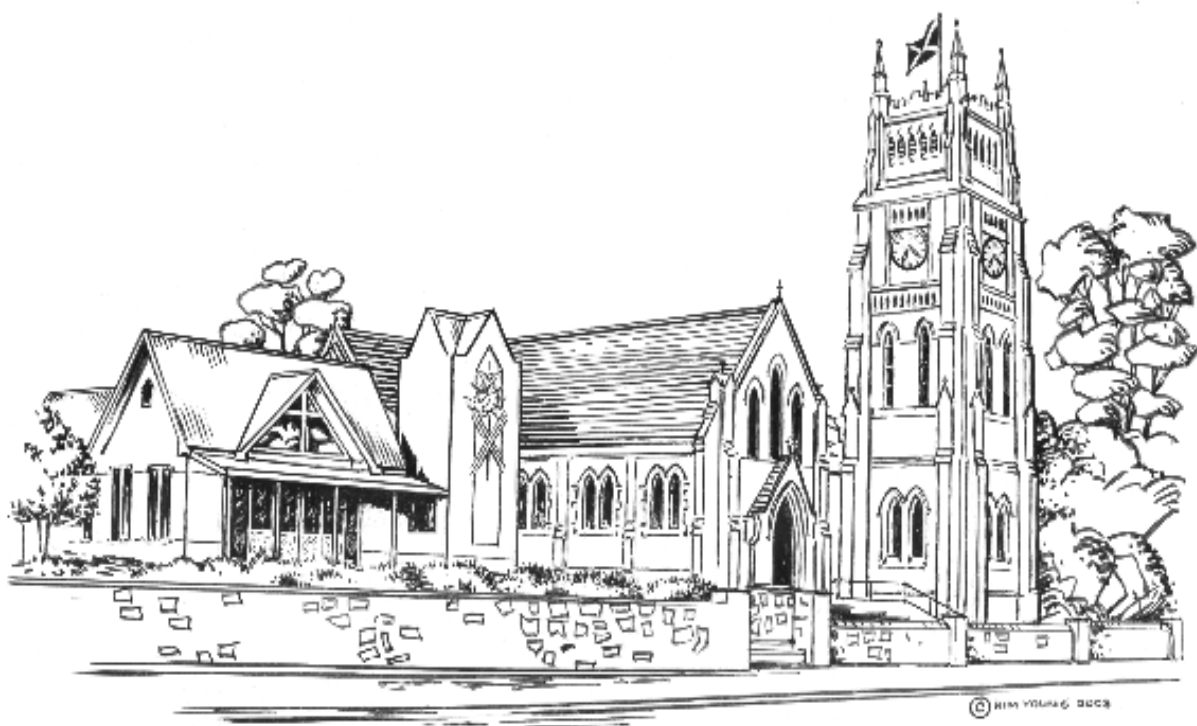

Readings

1st Reading: Proverbs 31.10-31

OT p. 561

Contemporary readers may question this text knowing that ancient texts often allow men to idealize female virtue in terms that benefit men and harm women. This passage praises an extraordinarily hard-working woman, a "capable wife," and one wonders if it sets women up to fall short. Some interpreters think this is not a real person but Woman

Wisdom, the personification of Wisdom, and praises her value when she is asked to 'work' in the areas of the home, the fields or in commerce, which would explain her extraordinary powers. But what is particularly interesting is what this passage doesn't say. It refuses to derive this woman's worth from her husband, or her child-bearing capacity, or her appearance; a particularly contemporary idea.

Psalm: Psalm 1 (said)

APBA p. 224

This psalm opens the Book of Psalms and sets a theme common to the 150 psalms that follow: delight in God's law. It contrasts those who 'delight in the law of the Lord' with those who engage in 'ungodly' behaviour. It is a wisdom psalm that fits well with the first reading, affirming our need to ponder daily the instruction of the Lord.

2nd Reading: James 3.1-12

NT p. 213

This passage is a piece of wisdom about how we are to use our speech. James uses the specific illustration of the tongue and what we say as a small example of how we are to shape every aspect of our lives to reflect our faith. The passage consists of a series of four metaphors for a careless tongue and how it may be controlled to everyone's benefit.

Gospel: Mark 9.30-37

NT p. 42

Jesus is heading south through Galilee, on his way to Jerusalem, trying to travel in secret, in contrast to the populism the disciples want for their Messiah. Jesus teaches them of his suffering and death and they just don't understand. To teach them about how the Kingdom of God works, he places a child in their midst. In contrast to those who have political status, or status because of their family or their wealth, Jesus puts a child in their midst, who has no status at all. Such are those who understand the nature of power in the Kingdom of God.
