

Readings

1st Reading: Acts 5.27-32

NT p. 114

The Acts of the Apostles tells the story of the early Church. One of its themes is how the first followers of Jesus imitated his life and teaching. Like Jesus, the apostles work cures and draw large crowds, including some who were hesitant to commit. This passage concludes with a short speech which summarizes the apostle's message: you killed him, but God made him alive. Luke understands Easter as God's "yes" where they had said "no".

Psalm: Psalm 118.14-29

APBA p. 348

Psalm 118 was associated with the Jewish Passover. And in the early Church, it had an Easter connection for Christians, ever since Peter quoted it in his sermon at the beginning of the Acts of the Apostles. Jesus, the Risen One, is the “stone that the builders rejected” and the rest of the psalm praises God for unexpected victory, an appropriate theme for our Easter season.

2nd Reading: Revelation 1.4-8

NT p. 227

The Book of Revelation was written to bolster the perseverance of persecuted Christians, and to settle some doctrinal disputes. It's told in the form of a vision. Much of the language is symbolic, to hide its meanings from the persecutors.

Gospel: John 20.19-31

NT p. 107

John's Gospel shows the disciples hiding behind locked doors, yet Jesus still reaches them. Thomas demands proof it is Jesus and not just some other kind of apparition. From doubt to devotion, from fear to boldness, from death to life, is the journey Jesus' disciples are called to undertake.

1. If Christ had not been raised from death
our faith would be in vain,
our preaching but a waste of breath,

his words deserve to die.
But now our great Redeemer lives;

his word endures, his Church revives
in Christ, our risen Lord.

From the Rector

C.S. Lewis once famously proclaimed of God's ultimate act at Easter "The war is already won – all that remains are the mopping up exercises". It seems to me that this mopping up is taking a very long time! But we cannot lose sight of the fact that this is the truth we proclaim, and the truth we live out in our lives as Christians.

No, the world does not need another glib, "she'll be right" platitude. But what the world does need is to hear again the promise contained within the events of Holy Week and Easter – the reminder that even as we gather in the shadow of the cross, and live our lives in the shadow of so many disasters and injustices, and concerns, that all of these have not only been experienced by our God (in the person of Jesus Christ), but also been overcome.

When Jesus was executed, for crimes he did not commit, he willingly gave his life. Not for himself, but for others. In this act we are truly shown what love looks like. But to his followers it appeared that all was lost. I suspect they believed that power had indeed overcome love; that the authorities had succeeded in quashing the Jesus movement.

But God had the final word – the word that said "no" – "no" to injustice; "no" to pain; "no" to military muscle; "no", even to death. That is the reality that we celebrate today. That is the reassurance given to the first believers, which inspired them so much that they spread this Gospel (literally "Good News") to the farthest bounds of their known world.

Tell the story, my friends – tell the truth of what it is we celebrate today – "Christ is Risen – Alleluia"!
