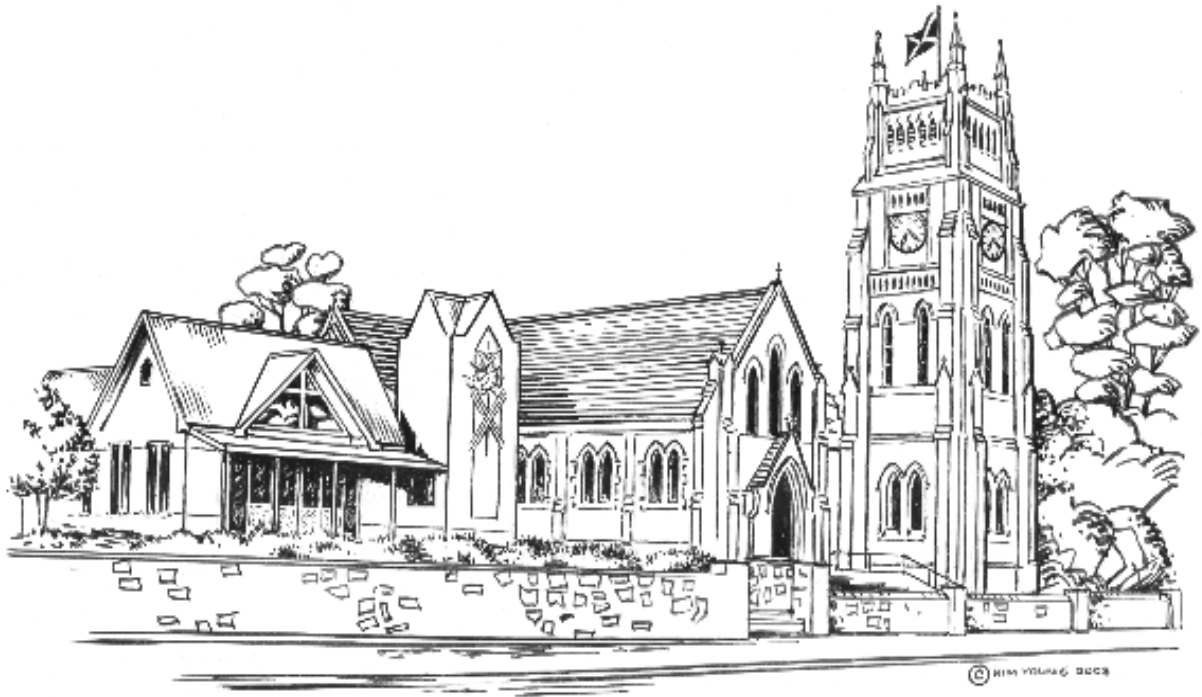

Reflection: Wisdom

“You can know many things, you can know a lot of facts about things, even facts about yourself, yet it is the things that you realise that move deeply into you. Wisdom then is a deeper way of knowing. Wisdom is the art of living in rhythm with your soul, your life and the divine. Wisdom is the way that you learn to decipher the unknown and the unknown is our closest companion. So, wisdom is the art of being courageous and generous with the unknown, of being able to decipher and recognise its treasures. In Celtic culture, and in the old Irish Celtic world, there was immense respect for wisdom. Since the Celtic world was primarily a matriarchal society very many of these wise people were women. The Celts had a wonderful tradition of wisdom which subsequently continued into Irish monasticism.”
