Lent 1 Bible Reading Introductions & Reflection Questions

The Season of Lent calls us into a journey – not just of outward practice, but of the heart. It is a time to pause, to listen, and to ask: What is stirring within me? What am I longing for? What might God be inviting me into?

Deuteronomy speaks of remembering – of looking back at where we have come from and offering thanks. It is a reminder that faith is not just about moving forward but about recognising God's presence in all that has been.

How can you practice gratitude for all God has provided in your life?

Paul's words in Romans remind us that faith is near, not something distant or difficult. Sometimes, we overcomplicate it. But at its heart, faith is about trusting that we are held, that we are loved, that we belong.

How does embracing the simplicity of faith open you up to a deeper relationship with God?

Luke's Gospel takes us into the wilderness, where Jesus faces choices. He could grasp for comfort, for certainty, for power. But instead, he chooses trust.

What things are you tempted to hold onto that keep you from trusting God?
