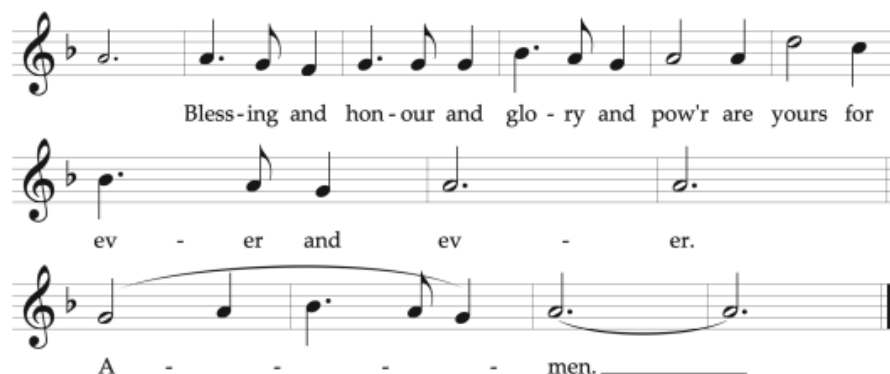

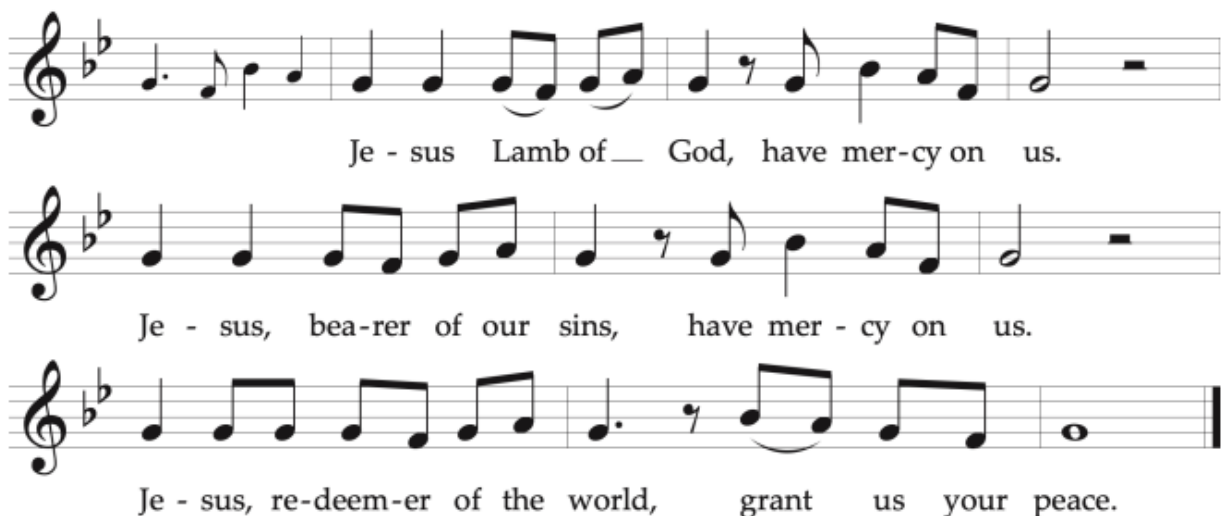

Lent 3 Bible Reading Introductions & Reflection Questions

Isaiah 55:1-9 offers a simple yet powerful invitation — come and receive what God freely gives. There is no cost, no need to earn a place at the table. While people often worry about having enough or doing enough, God offers welcome, mercy, and abundance beyond what we expect. This passage reminds us to trust in God's care and turn our hearts back to the one who provides all we truly need.

How does this passage shape your understanding of God's generosity?

1 Corinthians 10:1-13 reminds us that being part of God's people does not mean life will always be easy. Paul points to Israel's story as a lesson — not to take faith for granted or fall into bad habits. Life brings challenges, but God is always there, offering strength and a way forward. This passage encourages us to stay faithful, knowing we are never alone in our struggles.

How does Paul use Israel's history to warn the early church, and how does this apply today?

Luke 13:1-9 challenges the idea that bad things happen because of wrongdoing. Jesus shifts the focus from blaming others to looking at our own lives. The parable of the fig tree reminds us that God is patient, giving time to grow and change, but that time is also precious. This passage calls us to reflect on how we are living and to bear good fruit in response to God's love.

What "fruit" do you see in your life, and what areas still need growth?
